Qby. School adds hands-on building trades courses



Queensbury High School's new construction program in electri-

cal and carpentry skills has 40 students getting handson experience in in-demand building trades.

"It's proven to be very popular," Superintendent Dr. Doug Huntley told

The Chronicle. "College isn't for everybody, and we wanted to develop a program to satisfy the needs of local employers and help our students develop trade



skills."

Two years ago, Dr. Huntley

asked long-time middle school technology teacher John Potter to develop the curriculum. Construction and residential electricity classes are held in one of dozens of classrooms newly updated during the

continuing \$39-million Legacy 2020 Capital Project.

Mr. Potter said, "Students learn basic wiring at individual stations, adding power and putting cords in switches and outlets and then hooking them up. They learn how to wire a circuit panel and breaker boxes. Today they are working on three-way switches.

"Another class has built two sheds from the ground up, and Apex Solar donated solar panels, so these students will wire out the sheds for power."

The students will also earn an OSHA 10 certification, a key designation employers seek in hiring apprentices or employees.

Rob Chapman, Queensbury's director of facilities and operations, says, "We've asked contrac-
