Despite opposition including from Mayor Dan Hall, Chris Patten is holding firm to his plan to buy and develop the wedge of current green space he is under contract to buy from 333 Glen at the intersection of

He told *The* Chronicle he plans to submit "fully

comprehensive, fully conforming plans that will meet all GC-1 [General Commercial-1] requirements" in time to make the agenda of the next Planning Board meeting on Tuesday, April

Mr. Patten terms "unattainable" the Planning Board's call that he obtain an easement from 333 Glen to guarantee parking spots in the garage adjacent to the Travelers Insurance build-

The Glens Falls Business Improvement **District** has this rendering of a possible park even as Chris Patten still aims to build apts. at the corner of Glen and Bay Streets. Drops his mixed-use development plan, will seek OK for 43-apartment building even as Glens Falls eyes park by eminent domain

He says it "forced me to rescind the offer giving the City 44 percent of the property to use as a park, which I had also offered to build myself. Now I will have to use the whole lot, in order to contain the parking on the site." He notes that the front tip of the lot, closest to the Civil War monument, is already City property.

Mr. Patten said the constraints also led him to make the project all-residential, without first-floor commercial or retail.

He said he will "come forward with my strongest approach that conforms to all the requirements, meets green space, storm water, parking requirements and the building will be beautiful. It will still mimic the old



LG plans a busy summer: Thurs. fireworks, more

Lake George Mayor Bob Blais said he anticipates a nearly full roster of events this summer, after events were cancelled or greatly scaled back last year by Covid.

We are putting together everything we have done in the past, including fireworks, in hopes we will be able to do them. Based on what we have heard about the Covid and vaccines, we are cautiously optimistic. If you can believe what the doctors are saying, we're hoping by July to be able to have large gatherings, with masks."

Mr. Blais expects the Festival Commons at Charles R. Wood Park will be busy. "I'm finding there is more interest in the Festival Commons than there's ever been," with several new events anticipated.

On the schedule (all Covid-dependent): · Adirondack Wine and Food Festi-

- Adirondack Independence music festival (Sept. 3-5), produced by Dave Ehmann. Mr. Blais said Mr. Ehmann is also planning other possible music festivals.
- · Adirondack Nationals Car Show (Sept. 9-12)
- Americade Motorcycle Rally (dates shifted from June to September 21-25)
- Shriner's Circus returns, dates to be announced
- A new barbecue festival (also TBA). • The Village plans free entertainment in

the **Shepard Park** amphitheater. "We cut out Sunday and Monday night free shows to cut costs," Mayor Blais said,

"but we will continue with music on Tuesdays, Wednesday concerts by the Lake George Arts Project, the Fridays@The Lake series, and of course the Thursday fireworks."

Mr. Blais calls it "the most important thing" that draws visitors to the Village.

He said he is seeking funding from outside sources, Warren County and business sponsors, combined. "The fireworks cost about \$60,000, about \$5,250 per show," he said. "If we can cut that in half (with County funding) we might be successful in raising the rest privately."

ATF eyes outdoors at City Park, more downtown events

Chronicle Managing Editor Cathy DeDe writes: Glens Falls Mayor Dan Hall is touting a "full schedule" of 55 events planned downtown in City Park this summer.

Some are still tentative, depending on Covid restrictions, he says.

The Adirondack Theatre Festival has scheduled 19 dates in City Park as an alternative to indoor theater.

City Band Concerts are planned on nine Mondays from June 28 to August 23. Take a Bite food festivals are set for

eight Wednesdays, July 7 to August 25. The Park Theater has four Friday con-

certs scheduled from July 16 to 30. The Grandma's Table outdoor community dinner is August 22.

Glens Falls Kiwanis's Taste of the North Country food festival is Sept. 26. Glens Falls Collaborative's Fit Fest is scheduled on October 2.

Some event have two alternate dates.

LARAC June Arts Festival is set tentatively for June 12-13 or August 14-15.

"I take the community responses into consideration. I really do," Mr. Patten says. He contends the newly sub-divided par-

"I've got Park Place," he says, referencing the Monopoly board game. "Why would I exchange Baltic Avenue for Park Place?"

Mr. Patten believes unfair roadblocks have been put in his way, including the demand for the easement to guarantee parking in the garage.

He contends, "No other project has required an easement," such as this.

Mayor Dan Hall told *The Chronicle* after Mr. Patten's project was tabled at the last Planning Board meeting, for lack of specifics, "The City has made a statement that we are interested in keeping it as green space. That is what we prefer."

The City's Downtown Revitalization Initiative committee, overseeing Governor Cuomo's \$10 million grant to Glens Falls, has submitted a request to the state to shift the original DRI pocket park planned on South Street next to the former Dizzy Chicken to the 333 Glen Street site.

Of possibly taking the property by eminent domain, the mayor said, "We would be interested if we had to. We would hope it doesn't come to that. This administration, and I've polled most of the Common Council, the intent is to keep it as green space."

City Planning Board chairman Dan Bruno, contacted for comment, said, "I can't recall" what other recent projects required parking easements, but in general, any project requires that parking be tied in, either by deed or permanent easement.

"There's a lot to be considered," Mr. Bruno said. "It's the Planning Board's function and authority as to what is acceptable," in terms both of zoning laws and aesthetics.

"It's a lot on a corner of high visibility, with traffic and parking considerations, as well as how the proposed building fits in with the rest of the area....

"We are there to help applicants and to look out for the best interests of the City, and the citizens of Glens Falls."

Mr. Bruno says, "There is some consideration if the majority of the public is adamantly opposed to a project, but we have to put personal feelings aside and look at the project with respect to Chapter 220 (Zoning) and other considerations within our power."

He said the preliminary sketches Mr. Patten provided at last month's Planning Board meeting were "pretty basic, nothing we could really go on."

Judy Calogero spoke in opposition to the Patten project at the last Planning Board meeting. She is a member of both the Glens Falls IDA and EDC Warren County and she formerly was Commissioner of New York State's Division of Housing and Community Renewal.

"Walk the site," she urged *The Chronicle*.

"Access, square footage, how will it accommodate parking or emergency vehicles, handicapped parking, or people unloading

groceries, moving in and moving out? The space is just not there."

She also cited impact on the view of the Church of the Messiah, which she termed "one of the most important historical buildings in the City."

She said, "I wish the owners [of 333 Glen] had come to the City to say, 'We are thinking about selling the parcel.' They've generously allowed the City to use the site for years. They could have asked, 'Do you want it to continue as public space?'"

Ms. Calogero said, "Do I believe we need more development? Absolutely. Does every piece of property need to be developed? I don't think so."

Developer and business owner Elizabeth Miller, in a conversation with *The Chronicle*, said she hopes the city "does not miss" the opportunity she says Mr. Patten offers.

"There's a huge opportunity there to achieve real economic development, with the right building, and if you hold the developer accountable without putting up roadblocks," she says.

Realtor Mark Levack told the Planning Board that Mr. Patten is "a proven and quality developer," and he asked the board to remember that Mr. Patten is not asking for tax breaks or a PILOT [payment in lieu of taxes] agreement.



Jim Siplon's approach as CEO of **EDC Warren Co.**

Last summer EDC Warren County board member Jim Siplon stepped in as interim CEO of the economic development corporation after the unexpected death of its long-time president Ed Bartholomew.

Last month the EDC made the appointment permanent. Mr. Siplon, 55, is being paid \$130,000, Mr. Bartholomew's salary.

"Since July, our board has seen firsthand how he energizes people, marshals resources and catalyzes progress through public-private partnerships," EDC board chair Matt Fuller was quoted in the press release announcing the appointment.

"Our board concluded that we are fortunate to have in Jim Siplon a uniquely talented and insightful individual leading our economic development efforts at a moment of particular challenge and emerging opportunity."

Mr. Siplon came to Glens Falls as Chief Operating Officer of then startup Just Beverage. He said he retired last year. "Since I got here, I really fell in love with the area. I hoped I could do more for the whole region. I had imagined I might run for office. When I left Just, I was trying to figure out ways to get involved, and then events played out as they did."

Has he put a new stamp on the EDC? Mr. Siplon says "it's more that events of the day...causing us to quickly and nimbly as we could, reorganize and accelerate certain things happening.

"You have the relocation of workers,





workplaces decentralizing as more people work remotely. That has been going on for years, but the speed at which it accelerated with Covid is unprecedented."

"The same is true for the resources everybody needs to sustain progress.

Mr. Siplon says, "Economic development is less about chasing big companies and recognizing, sometimes it's the one or two people operating out of a loft in Brooklyn, how to attract them to come here. We need to be investing in things that have been outside the realm of traditional economic development, such as broadband" Internet access.

It's now "a lifeline that is fundamental." he says, for connecting students to schools, Please turn to page 15





To media that despise Trump, it's of little matter. His detractors were quick to cite terrible things he *did* in fact say. But if the news actually wants to win trust beyond their preferred viewpoint, it needs to accept how shattering it is to credibility when reporting is drastically wrong.

I'd never heard of J. David Power, but I read his March 4 obituary in the Wall Street Journal. It turns out he was much better known as J.D. Power, who started a business from his kitchen table in 1968 "telling auto makers something many of them didn't want to hear — what customers thought about the quality of their cars."

At first he was ignored and worse. But when Toyota bought the market research he was selling, Mr. Power was off to the races. Now a high grade from J.D. Power & Associates is something companies tout and shout about.

Some interesting races already shaping up: Geraghty vs. York in Wbg.; McDevitt vs. Landry

In Warrensburg, word from *The Post-Star* on Monday that former Warren County Sheriff **Bud York** intends to challenge incumbent Town Supervisor **Kevin Geraghty** sets up a **very intriguing Republican primary** come June 22. Both men are proven vote-getters, who've defeated challengers before.

In Glens Falls, the prospective Ward 2 race for Warren County Supervisor between incumbent Republican Peter McDevitt and Democratic challenger Bob Landry is likewise compelling, because both men have previously won election to the job. Now that Bob has retired as executive director of the Glens Falls Housing Authority, he's re-entering politics. Meanwhile, Peter showed two years ago when he defeated Matt Brown that he's still ready to campaign and up for a challenge. The election is Nov. 3. — Mark Frost



Fitzy the barber in Fort Edward marks his 80th birthday by going to work

Fitzy's Barber Shop, across Broadway from Saint Joseph's Roman Catholic Church. Fitzy turned 80 years old Tuesday and

went to work as usual. Does he think about retiring? "I'll retire when I'm tired."

Fitzy and his wife Linda live north on Broadway, up the hill from downtown. "I can throw it in neutral and never push the pedal and get to work," he says, but actually he never drives to the shop directly.

"I like to change it up." He'll first drive off in random directions to "break the routine." He listens to some customers who are unhappy with their jobs and wonders why anyone would keep doing something they hated doing.

"They're in a rut," he says. "You can get out of a routine. It's hard to get out of

Fitzy says his first marriage ended in divorce.

Of his second wife Linda, he says. "I met her 30 years ago. I wish I would've met her 60 years ago." Along with his own son, Fitzy says Linda's two children "are like my own." He details all of their lives, the jobs, the spouses, the grandchildren.

Fitzy is a people person and a worker. Beyond barbering, he's got 48 years in at the volunteer fire department, including having served as chief as well as a decade he spent as Washington County's Deputy Fire Coordinator; 20 years he umpired high school baseball games; 20 years he delivered 900 or a thousand *Post-Stars* a night, stuffing 300 tubes, bringing the rest to stores.

"I used to get up at midnight" to do the



newspaper route. "There would be people out waiting for me at 2 a.m." He said he'd get home at 6, sleep for a couple of hours, "grab a cuppa coffee" and then go to the barber shop. Even now, he says, "I only sleep three or four hours a night.'

Here's how Fitzy became a barber. After high school, he did a stint in the Army. After that, "I had enough of school," he says. "Joe Plude was my barber in Glens Falls. I kinda liked it," seeing him "running the business, mingling with the

Fitzy went to barber school in Rochester, because there were no spots at the time at the one in Schenectady. "I apprenticed up in Glens Falls with Mike Massiano.

Bill Culligan had the Lunch Box in Fort Edward. "I used to stop in his restaurant. He told me 'Steve [Puylara, Fort Edward's then-barber] is gonna be retiring."

Fitz rented the shop, first from Steve and then from Steve's widow. When she died, Fitzy moved down the street to the shop he has now.

What's he think of Fort Edward?

"I like it. I like the people. It's a good close-knit community. It's home."



Fitzy is wry. Best to listen care-

fully; he will pull your leg if you let him. On the afternoon of this interview, Fitzy pulled back the barber cloth from one customer to show it said "Village of Fort Edward" on the back of the man's T-shirt.

"He's the mayor of Fort Edward," Fitzy told me. He wasn't.

As another customer reached the chair, Fitzy declared, "We're doing nothing but buzz cuts today."

"This guy here," he says of a customer. "He was a legend. He was the biggest bachelor in town. I won't go further. I'll save your hide right there."

'We give-and-take pretty good," he says of his clientele. "I could probably give up barbering. The people — that's why I come back. How can I give up Donnie here? I've been cutting his hair for 50 years. It's tough when you've got so many friends."

For the first 35 years, Fitzy's **hours** were 7 in the morning to 6 at night because in Fort Edward's boom time, "the guys coming out of the mill at seven in the morning — before they went over....[to] one of the bars, they got their hair cut.'

He later cut back to 9 to 5. "Now I'm 10 to 4," Tuesday to Friday, half a day Saturday. "I don't miss a day. I come in every day," except when he had a hip replaced.

He said he used to cut residents' hair at Fort Hudson nursing home before they set up a room for that purpose. Sometimes, he said, "I used to have to get down on the hard floor on my knees for some of them" in difficult postures in wheelchairs.

Fitzy's mother and father both worked at shirt factories in Glens Falls. He mentions the York Rotary Shirt factory on Broad Street as well as McMullen. His mother was from Bennington, Vermont, his father from Brooklyn. They met in Glens Falls.


Fitzy's grandfather, his mother's father, was "Bill O'Malley — a big old tough Irishman," who for a time lived with them.

Fitzy said Mr. O'Malley walked to work at Finch, Pruyn wearing "dress pants, shirt and tie" and changed into his work clothes at the mill. "You weren't seen on the

street in their work clothes," he said.

On Third Street in the evenings, he remembers, people would be on each other's front porches, "you know, just visiting. You don't see that much anymore." When the weather turned cold, they'd gather "inside, playing Michigan rummy for pennies."

I asked if Fitzy ever thought of running for office. He did run, in the 1980s, he said, but "that's a long story." I

insisted he tell it. He said he ran for village trustee, knocked on nearly every door and that his platform was: I want to do away with my job. They said, 'You're giving up barbering?' I said, no, I'm giving up trustee. I think it's past time they should consolidate the village and the town."

Election day arrived. One of his barbershop customers comes in and says "I tried to vote for you but I couldn't." It was a pullthe-lever machine, and that whole row of candidate levers was locked.

Fitzy says the man in charge of the machines was working at the canal in Waterford and they had to get him to come up and unlock it. In the meantime, they used paper ballots, but there was "an hour or so" before the problem had been noticed and that he doesn't know how many people didn't get a chance to vote for him.


Fitzy said he lost by 11 votes. He says a judge got in touch and offered to throw the whole election out, but "I said no, I don't wanna do that to these people."

The defeat had a silver lining. Pretty quickly, he says, "I got to thinking 'Thank, God," because "when people come to my door I want them coming for in for a haircut instead of 'You know my neighbor just threw snow on my driveway."

Cars are another Fitzy passion. There are photos in the shop of "Cottonhead" Durkee's car dealership and Fitzy recalls a long ago impromptu race "on the Adamsville Flats" with a Studebaker Avanti taking on Ben Aronson's Corvette for a quarter-mile — "four or five telephone poles."

Fitzy loves his classics.

"The two cars I would want are the Studebaker Avanti, a terrific piece of equipment, and the 1955 Chevrolet Bel Air."







for telehealth and for remote workers.

"Funding is increasingly coming from federal rather than state government," Mr. Siplon says. He says such resources are more easily pursued on a regional basis, rather than "town by town."

He calls **Warren County's collabora-**

tive approach to the coronavirus pandemic "the magic sauce that made the difference for Lake George and this region."

Businesses and government entities "set egos aside," he says, "and said let's do this for everyone's mutual benefit. That is not what you saw in all communities.

He says Warren County is part of an Adirondack working group advocating not only for broadband funding, but on such issues as combatting current Department of Transportation fees to lay wire on stateowned highways that he says are cited by providers as a prohibitive cost.

Mr. Siplon says attracting large and small businesses has much to do with maintaining a presence on social media such as LinkedIn and Instagram.

He's added two new EDC positions -Economic Development Program Coordinator and Communications Director.

He said he kept the EDC budget request from Warren County flat for 2021, and took a cut from the City funding, relying on reserve funds to pay for the new positions.

In the long term, Mr. Siplon said he aims to increase membership and develop other sources of income to grow the budget. He said the 2021 budget is about \$500,000.

Mr. Siplon said he aims to attract businesses focused on clean tech and clean energy. "The majority of our surface area is being the Blue Line (of the Adirondack Park). It's how people think of this area."

does it further the crafting of good law. It just stops the process dead in its tracks.

The practical result, particularly in this polarized time, is that the Senate either gets 60 votes to end a filibuster so they can get back to real business, or nothing is accomplished.

To pass progressive legislation such as voting reforms, universal health care, climate change legislation, and immigration reform, we need to abolish the filibuster...

The filibuster is not required by nor is it as much as mentioned in the Constitution. It is an outdated construct of Senate rules. Even after it was created in the

early 1800s, it was rarely used until the second half of the 20th century.

While both parties have used it when in the minority, it has been weaponized to a greater extent than ever before by Republicans looking to kill landmark reforms supported by vast majorities of Americans, from civil rights, to women's rights to gun violence prevention and beyond.

"American citizens are increasingly frustrated with their elected representatives and the filibuster is one reason our government has not been able to lead responsibly."
