Colossal changing of the guard at **Double-H**

Double H Ranch — the camp for critically ill children founded in 1993 by Charley Wood and actor Paul Newman at a former dude ranch in Lake Luzerne is making a colossal transition.

Dr. Kathleen Braico, 73, the camp's medical director since the camp began 29 years ago, is stepping aside. Dr. Chris Woll, 35, is succeeding her.

His connection to Double H is profound and lifelong. At age seven, he was diagnosed with life-threatening alveolar rhabdomyosarcoma, a soft tissue cancer, necessitating chemotherapy and, at Sloan Kettering in New York, surgery.

But amid the grueling treatment, he got the chance to at-

333 Glen for sale: \$15-million

333 Glen — the 10-story downtown building that houses Travelers Insurance and other tenants went on the market last week for \$15-million. Glens Falls's only

"skyscraper," it's already generating "good interest," says listing agent Mark Levack. He said numerous entities have filed the non-disclosure forms required to

view specs on the property. Mr. Levack touts 333 Glen also known as Monument Square — as "the region's number one corporate office address."

It was built in 1973 for Continental Insurance, which had purchased the Glens Falls Insurance Company and razed its long-time building next-door.

333 Glen encompasses 190,000-square feet — 163,373 of it leasable space —on a 4.96 acres, said Mr. Levack. "That in-

It's a "go!" The 48th Adirondack Hot Air Balloon Festival will proceed, with a threeday run, Friday to Sunday, Sept. 24 to 26, organizer Mark Donahue tells The Chroni-

It will be limited to **50 balloons** rather than 100 — but there will still be special shapes.

Other notable changes:


 No Thursday flight in Crandall Park -That's usually the localsfocused kickoff. "We just can't do good crowd control in Crandall Park," Mr. Donahue said.



- · Glens Falls's Thursday evening downtown party is a 'yes.' It will have "candlestick" balloon torch firings & more.
- · Friday's launches will take place in five communities, not a mass launch at Warren County Airport. Mr. Donahue said the communities will be "Glens Falls, Queensbury, South Glens Falls, Hudson Falls and one other we haven't finalized." He said he can't release specific locations until the details are worked out.
- Saturday and Sunday morning launches will be roped off. They will take place as usual at Warren County Airport, "but for the first time ever, spectators will be roped off from the balloons," Mr. Donhaue said. "That's for safety reasons, and to spread out the crowd. We will also be spreading the balloons out along both runways, on the entire airport area.
- Saturday night, two drive-through **Moonglows only.** There will be no Saturday late afternoon balloon launch, but 40 tethered balloons, lighted from within, at the airport. There will be a second, smaller Moonglow of 8-10 balloons Saturday night at East Field in Glens Falls, with spectators seated in the bleachers.
- No Sunday afternoon launch at Crandall Park, also for crowd control.
- Pilots not allowed to take paid pas**sengers.** Pilots must be vaccinated, Mr. Donahue said, but the Festival can't guarantee the passengers will be vaccinated, creating possible liability, he explained.
- No vendors. No non-profit vendors, Zonta Craft Fair, kids' activities, live music or Open Door Balloon Breakfast at the airport or other events. "Believe me, that hurts us too," said Mr. Donahue. "We raise a lot of funds that way, and as a person who works for non-profits (as executive director of CWI, Inc.), the last thing I want to do is hurt them." He said, "People are welcome to bring their own food." He added, "The only thing that may happen is a vaccination clinic" at the airport.
- 'Everything will still be free, as always," Mr. Donahue emphasized.
- The weekend will be a tribute to essential workers. Mr. Donahue said they will raffle balloon rides for then.
- Sponsor info is coming That will look different as well, Mr. Donahue says.

"Pilot invitations are going out shortly, Obviously, it will be very different this year, especially with the pandemic coming back."

creating a whole new event with a lot more players," says Mr. Donahue of organizing this year's Adirondack Bal-





loon Festival in the era of Covid. Last year's festival was cancelled outright.

Warren County, New York State, local municipalities, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and Centers for Disease Control (CDC) are all involved in the decision making, Mr. Donahue said.

"We are doing everything we can to make it very busy while also a socially conscious and safe event."

"The hoops we've had to jump through to make this happen. It's the largest gathering of people we have here. The last thing I want is for the Balloon Festival to be blamed for bringing the pandemic back."





GF teen drowns on Schroon, tubing

Glens Falls Middle School student **Owen Harrington**, **15**, drowned Friday afternoon in a tubing accident in Warrensburg. He finished eighth-grade in June.

State Police said preliminary investigation determined Owen "was tubing on the Schroon River when he became dislodged from his tube after striking a downed tree in the waterway." He "became submerged... during an attempt to get him to shore." He was transported to Glens Falls Hospital "where he was declared deceased."

Owen was the son of Matthew and Courtney (Lockhart) Harrington and was born February 28, 2007 in Glens Falls.

His obituary said, "Those left to cherish his memory are his parents; grandparents David Harrington, Sue-lynn Johnson, and Laurie and Matt Hoskins; sisters: Whitney and Asaycia; uncles: Brendon and Ryan Johnson, and Pete and Mike Harrington; cousins: Alex, Zack, Pat, Danielle, Hailey, Jaremiah, Grace, and Mary; and his beloved pets: Fenway and Jinx."

It added, "Owen enjoyed gaming, fishing, snowboarding, camping, and hanging with his friends. He was looking forward to entering his freshman year at Glens Falls High School in the fall."

A GoFundMe "to help with funeral expenses, loss of work monies and getting back on her feet to function after suddenly losing her child," was created by Owen's great-aunt Brenda Vogt on behalf of her niece, Owen's mom Courtney Lockhart.

As of Tuesday, the drive had raised \$8,855 of a \$10,000 goal, with 144 donors.

Cuomo talks: Covid vaccine mandates

The surge in COVID-19 cases from the Delta Variant has at least 28 New York counties deemed now to have "substantial" spread, prompting recommendations forwearing of masks indoors in public spaces by both the vaccinated and unvaccinated.

Governor Andrew Cuomo said, "Everybody is talking about mask policies right now, but I don't believe a mask policy is going to be enough — we need to talk about a vaccination policy."

'We've taken the first step by mandating that all state employees get the vaccine or get tested weekly...

'The state is leading the way, but local governments, schools, public hospitals and even businesses should start considering mandatory vaccinations as well because if these numbers start to rise quickly, we can't afford to go backward and lose the progress we've already

In New York City, proof of vaccination will be required "for workers and customers in indoor dining, in indoor fitness facilities, indoor entertainment facilities," said Mayor Bill de Blasio. "The only way to patronize these businesses indoors is if you're vaccinated, at least one dose."



Dick McGuire, 98 and sharp

All these years I don't know how I managed not to meet Richard McGuire. I was always aware of him, accomplished Salem dairy farmer and that he served as the State Agriculture Commissioner.

We just never crossed paths. Fortunately, his longevity let me remedy the missed opportunity. He's 98 years old.

On a Sunday in July, son Zander and I visited his Penope farm museum for the first time during a Washington County Historical Association open house. Dick himself was on hand and available. And very sharp.

Zander and I wandered through the several buildings and the distinct, well-organized displays. It's very personal to Dick, and, as a result, very enjoyable for us because he's apparently always been interested and interesting. He saved a lot of things, from tractors, sleighs and cars to plows, tools, photos, books, even a relative's artwork.

I was taken by an extensive collection of 1940s-50s sheet music — songs made famous by Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra. I asked Dick about it. It's piano music, he explained. Did you play the piano? No, he said; his late wife Polly did. She was a music teacher.

Then he tossed in: "I sang for a dance band for five years." It was the Bessie Worm band from Salem, he said. He sang "ballads." They played "all the lakes — Hedges, Lauderdale, Bomoseen."

Wowser! Before the world centralized, standardized, televised (and computerized), Washington County (and adjacent Vermont) had its own performing circuit. It swung! My parents' music. Dick and my father were born within a year of each other. Benny Goodman, anyone?

The artwork I mentioned was by Dick's relative Jennie Mae McGuire Bennett, 1889-1973, who was ahead of her time, a farm girl who went to college when that wasn't done, who taught art and made art, not for money, but for family and herself. Dick knew enough to value it, to display it in its own nice upstairs setting. There were pieces

AG concludes: **Cuomo harassed** women; officials declare: Resign

This is a sad day for New York because independent investigators have concluded that Governor Cuomo sexually harassed multiple women and, in doing so, broke the law," New York Attorney General Letitia **James** said Tuesday, as she released her long-awaited report on Andrew Cuomo.

It concluded that "the Governor sexually harassed a number of current and former New York State employees by, among other things, engaging in unwelcome and nonconsensual touching, as well as making numerous offensive comments of a suggestive and sexual nature that created a hostile work environment for women."

The AG's office said, "While the governor denied the most serious allegations, the investigators found that he did so by offering 'blanket denials' or that he had a 'lack of recollection as to specific incidents'.'

Calls for his resignation or impeachment came from elected officials in both parties.

New York's U.S. Senators Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand -Cuomo's fellow Democrats — released a joint statement that said in part:

"The New York State Attorney General has conducted an independent, thorough and professional investigation that found the Governor violated state and federal law, had a pattern of sexually harassing current and former employees, retaliated against at least one of the accusers and created a hostile work environment.

"No elected official is above the law. The people of New York deserve better leadership in the governor's office. We continue to believe that the Governor should resign.'

Republican Congresswoman Elise **Stefanik** said "justice must be served. Governor Cuomo must resign and be arrested immediately."

President Joe Biden, when asked if

the Governor should be impeached and removed if he refuses to step down, said "Let's take one thing at a time here. I think he should resign."

Democratic Governors Tom Wolf of Pennsylvania, **Phil Murphy** of New Jersey, Ned Lamont of Connecticut, and Dan McKee of Rhode Island issued a joint statement: "We are appalled at the findings of the independent investigation by the New York Attorney General. Governor Cuomo should resign from office.'

Republican State Senator Dan Stec said, "In February, I was one of the very first to call on Governor Cuomo to resign. Now with today's report from the attorney general, including 179 individuals interviewed and over 74,000 documents reviewed, it should be clear to even the most loyal of Cuomo's supporters that he is unfit to lead and he should resign immediately."

Democratic Assembly Member Carrie Woerner said, "I called for the Governor's resignation when these credible allegations came to light earlier this year....In light of the pervasive appalling behavior documented in this report, he should immediately resign. Failing this, the Assembly should impeach Andrew Cuomo.

"As a voter in New York, I am angry. As a human being, I am disgusted."

Governor Cuomo apparently will fight on. In a webcast Tuesday after the AG's report was issued, he said, "I want you to know directly from me that I never touched anyone inappropriately or made








the original and still CEO and executive director of Double H Ranch.

"He came to the [Glens Falls Hospital] pediatric department meeting in the late winter, I guess, of the first year," Dr. Braico recalls, "and he said, 'Charley Wood has asked me to open this camp for kids with serious illnesses. And we need a medical director, I was hoping we can get someone local.' And we all smiled at him and then he left.

"And then he came back a couple of months later, and he said, 'we still need a medical director.' And I felt sorry for him. So I said, 'Okay, I'll do it.' But I didn't know what I was getting into."

Was it hard to establish initial camp protocols? "It was," says Dr. Braico, "because what I had was, you know, a manual from a regular old camp about what to do for bug bites and sunburn."

Double H campers had life-threatening diseases and life-lasting afflictions.

"I was part-time," Dr. Braico recalls. "I had a full-time practice, young kids. I was only able to be there — I would come in early in the morning, like 7, 7:30 in the morning, but I wasn't there all day."

When the camp opened in 2003, "we saw a handful of kids. And obviously, the first summer, we didn't have that much. But after that we're looking for kids with serious illnesses."

Albany Med's essential assistance

Was she daunted? "Yeah, once I realized what it is I was pretty daunted. But by that time, we had Albany Med on board. So I didn't have to be daunted all by myself, I had lots of backup. And they have been ab solutely the backbone of all of this..."

"So when I needed to figure out how do I write a sickle cell anemia form, I didn't have to invent that. I called the hematologist at Albany Med and said, 'What should be on this form?' And they told me."

Dr. Braico said that "after the first summer, Charley and Paul approached Albany Med." Charley and Paul were camp co-founders entrepreneur/philanthropist Charley Wood and actor Paul Newman.

She said Double H "talked to the pediatric department there about sending volunteer doctors for each session. Fortunately, Albany Med said yes, and they've been behind us every step of the way since then....

"And we have Albany Med docs. Initially, it was one per session, and now we have two and sometimes we'll have three or more in a given session. And they do all the heavy lifting, they take care of the kids. And so if there's a child with a medical crisis, they take care of the medical crisis.

"So my job has basically evolved into, you know, policies and procedures."

Only such camp running as one nowDr. Braico notes that of all the Serious-





Fun camps for seriously ill children, Double H is "the only camp in the U.S. that is serving kids as campers this summer.

"All the other ones either were closed for the summer or they are just holding family sessions where each family is a separate pod...But here the kids do get to interact with their own cabin. It's just the cabins do not interact with each other."

There have been no incidents of Covid, said Dr. Braico, looking for some wood to knock on for luck.

She credits in part precautions of their Medical Advisor Board, including Ginelle

Says Charley Wood didn't just start Double-H; he set in motion such camps around the world

Three decades ago, actor Paul Newman turned Charley Wood down cold.

"At that point," says Dr. Kathy Braico, "Paul Newman had founded the Hole in the Wall...camp, and it had been in business for five years" providing a fun experience in Connecticut for kids dealing with life-threatening/life-changing illnesses.

"As I understand it," says Dr. Braico, "Charley...wanted Paul to help him start another camp and called him and he wasn't interested. He [Newman] said, 'I've done it, you know, why should I want to do another one?' And apparently, Charley said something along the lines of, 'I may not be as rich and famous as you are, but I have just as big a heart and I want to do this."

"If you remember Charley Wood, he was a hard man to say no to. So he did convince Newman to go in with them."

Dr. Braico continues, "So it's my opinion that the reason there is a SeriousFun children's network [of camps across the nation and around the world] now is because of Charley, because if he hadn't pushed Paul Newman to start a second camp, and then hot on the heels of the second camp came the third camp and the fourth camp.


"And then somebody said, 'Well, we have so many camps, we have to make something official about all the camps'...

"At first it was called the Association of Hole in the Wall camps. And then they changed the name to the Serious Fun children's network. And then they expanded internationally."

There are nine SeriousFun camps in the United States, and many more around the world, including South Africa, Ethiopia, Israel, Ireland, India, Vietnam, and others. — Mark Frost

Jones at Warren County Public Health, "who should be sanctified, that woman."

Among other things, "Public Health provides us with the testing equipment, we didn't have to pay for it because it's expensive, so we can do tests on site."

Credits counselors; they 'get hooked'

Dr. Braico also emphasizes, "What makes the camp run isn't me. What makes the camp run is the staff there. And the ingenuity and the adaptability of the staff..."

She said counselors get "hooked" and return year after year.

"I never could have dreamed it would turn into what it is," says Dr. Braico.

Of stepping down now as Double H medical director, she says, "It's time. Camp needs somebody younger, needs somebody still in practice. I retired from my local practice about 10 or 11 years ago. And it's also the position...What worked for me...is not what camp needs now."

"My position has always been a summer position. So basically I'm paid for the eight weeks...that we would have camp during the summer. And I'm available all the rest of the year and I go to meetings and stuff like that, but I'm not officially on staff any other time except during the summer."

"Camp had grown enough and it was getting complex enough that they needed somebody who was going to be there, not full-time...but it does require somebody to be at monthly meetings, or biweekly meetings, or whatever. And to be more involved in some of the decision making than I have

Jokes, 'Dr. Woll wanted my job'

Has she offered advice to Dr. Chris Woll, who is succeeding her? "Oh, yeah, we've been doing a lot of talking."

"He's perfect," says Dr. Braico. "You couldn't ask for a better person to take the place. And because he has literally more insight, knowledge of the camp than I do, because I'm not there all the time. You know, I didn't live with the kids at camp. He's really a terrific choice."

"And," she laughs, "I knew he wanted my job for at least the last 10 years. I knew

What does Dr. Braico want people to know about Double H? "I want them to know it's here. It's amazing that a camp has been here for 29 years and I still will run into people who live here and don't know about it. Each one of the camps in the system have to raise all of their own funds, all their own operating funds."

The Double-H budget runs into millions of dollars — just shy of \$4-million last year when camp was largely curtailed, nearly \$5-million at full throttle a year earlier, according to its IRS Form 990 filing.

Dr. Braico said, "We need the support of a local community. If we don't have the support of the local community, we're done. There's no way that these kids can be served. And we serve a huge number of local kids, but we serve kids from all over the Northeast and adjacent states that don't have camps or some of them serve different conditions than we do.

Guatemala Medical Mission & more

Dr. Braico's many other civic pursuits include "the Glens Falls Medical Mission. I've been going to Guatemala with them since the 90s.

"We haven't gone since the pandemic started, but we are working with the community still providing funds for food.

"And because we used to go every six months, we would store leftover drugs that weren't going out of date for the next mission. And when it became clear we weren't getting back soon enough, we got all those

Dr. Braico: How Double H changes kids', parents' lives

Dr. Kathleen Braico calls her 29 years as the founding Medical Director of the Double-H Ranch "the biggest adventure

But she says, "What it does for the kids is just absolutely amazing...
"When they first come to camp, they

may never have left home without their parents. They've left home, they've been in the hospital, and they've traveled maybe halfway around the country to get the treatment that they needed. But to go and to go someplace without their parent over them is new for the kid.

And for the parents, it's terrifying. The parents have spent however many years they've been dealing with whatever condition the child has, trying to protect them, and trying to make sure that people understand their child and will care for the child — and the trust that they have to put in us the first time they leave that child off at camp, that, it takes incredible courage.'

Dr. Braico says the camp experience gives so much to the children...Paul Newman said that he wanted them just to be a kid, you know, just to have the joy of childhood back."

She said it lets them escape "niches." "You remember third grade? So you're in third grade, and you're the class clown, or you're the studious one, or you're the one who never could understand math. And all **your classmates** who you've been with since kindergarten and will be with until you graduate from high school have put you into a niche, and they're not gonna let you out of that niche. Even if you change, they won't let you change."

"Imagine if you're in a wheelchair, you know. Add not just whatever awkwardness you had about a child being a child, but add the fact that you can't get yourself up a flight of stairs, or that you can't run because your illness, you know, doesn't give you the strength to run or you spend months out of every year in a hospital and you miss all the things of childhood.

The kids have put those kids into a niche, too. And many of them have a lot of trouble making friends and they certainly have trouble identifying themselves as being confident.

"But then they go to camp and they go up in the high ropes course! Can you imagine how they feel going home from that? Or **they ride a horse** for the first time. Or pop a balloon **with an arrow** in archery

"The kids come out so positive," said Dr. Braico.

drugs distributed to the patients that we normally see."

She's said she's also involved in "Helping Babies Survive," which described as a World Health Organization program "to teach midwives newborn resuscitation with basic equipment, so that a midwife any place — it was developed for Africa actually — so somebody in a hut in Africa with no running water and no electricity can still resuscitate a baby."

She says she has taught it in Bangladesh, Guatemala and Haiti.

Closer to home, Dr. Braico is a leader in the not-for-profit Amorak, which provides free activities for kids in Hudson Falls and Fort Edward. The Red Cross and climate groups are other of her involvements.



Double H's new medical chief was camper there as child with cancer

Dr. Chris Woll was an eight-year-old cancer patient from Clifton Park when he first attended Double H as a camper.

Once he started, he never stopped — "every summer, up until I aged out as a camper...I started when I was eight and came until I was 16." Then, from "17 to 25. I came as a counselor. And I held various roles on staff of being a cabin counselor, a unit leader, and then medical staff as well."

What did the Double H experience do for his cancer fight? "It gave you hope and motivation throughout the year to get back to camp and see all of your friends," he says. "That gave you a purpose."

"In terms of recovery, I think it gives you a **positive outlook** on everything, **which I think is a large part of the battle** of recovery. You know, it's easy to get down on yourself and get frustrated. But I think camp gave me at least some good coping skills and healthy outlets. That facilitated recovery for me."

He also met his future wife, now Dr. Kate Woll, at Double H. They have two children. "We were both campers here. And we were both counselors here. Now she's a pediatrician over at Latham Pediatrics. She was actually a nurse's child. So the nurses who come work [here] for the week, they get to bring their kids up for the weekend."

Was it love at first sight? "For me," he says. "I can't say the same for her."


Marriage is a frequent result at Double H. "We were talking about all the couples that have ended up from camp, like, it's crazy," says Dr. Woll.

He remembers vividly the onset of the cancer, at age 7. "I was coming home from, like, a regular summer camp," he says. "And I can still remember sitting in the backseat passenger side of the car and telling my mom, 'Hey, Mom, my legs don't look the same. Like there's something off.' It didn't hurt. It wasn't bothering me at all. I just noticed that it looked different."

His cancer was confirmed by a biopsy at Ellis Hospital in Schenectady. "Most of my chemo was done at Albany Med. I had my major surgeries and some chemo done at Memorial Sloan Kettering, as well, down in New York. I had one major surgery where they took out most of my left calf muscle. That had pretty extensive rehab, and intense chemo down at Memorial.

"That was unpleasant...All I can remember of those days of when I was having chemo, just feeling sick all the time."

He beat the disease, then set his sights

not surprisingly on a medical career.

"Undergrad was at SUNY Upstate. Then I did a year of just classes at UAlbany to get all of my requirements done for med school applications. I worked a year as a radiation therapist. Then I went to med school at SUNY Upstate for four years.

"I knew I wanted to go into medicine, because of my experience and wanting to give back to the community that had helped me and my family out so much. And then my experience at camp solidified the thought that I wanted to work with kids," he said.

"I worked as a radiation therapist that one year and that was mostly adults. And that again solidified that I definitely do not want to work with adults," he laughed.

"I did pediatric residency at Duke. I did that for three years...You know I always thought that I was going to go into hematology and oncology just because of my experience. But I had found that I really liked emergency medicine. It gave me a lot of flexibility, more so to be up at camp as much as I wanted. So I did three years of training at Yale for pediatric emergency medicine."

"So now I'm in the pediatric emergency department at Albany Med. And I work there full-time."

"Normally I am back home working in the hospital, and then I'm up here one day a week to do meetings and check in with the 'Body Shop,' Double H's wryly named infirmary.

Dr. Woll has known founding medical director Dr. Kathy Braico all along.

"As a camper, I had no idea how much work she put into it, everything just ran seamlessly. And I came and I had fun, and I went home....And then when I came as a medical student, you start to grasp how dedicated she's been to this place since day one, and how much time and energy she's put in — to make it run flawlessly."

The Chronicle asked when Double H approached him about succeeding her? He said it went the opposite way.

"I tried to plant the seed many years ago, me being interested in the job," Dr. Woll says. "A lot of my decisions for my career were based on coming back and being involved with camp to the fullest of my capacity. I was formally approached probably. maybe about a year ago."

Is it daunting to succeed Dr. Braico?

"Of course! Of course! I don't want to be the guy who drops the ball. She's done such a good job for the past almost 30 years." But he continues, "I think it's daunting in a good way. It's motivating. I think motivating is a good word for it."

The camp wasn't able to operate last summer due to the Covid pandemic, but it is going this summer in a curtailed basis.

"We're probably at about 40% right now, around there," Dr. Woll says. "About 50 campers per session." How's it going? He knocked on wood. "Three weeks and not a hiccup," he said when *The Chronicle* interviewed him in mid-July.

He was the volunteer doctor on duty that



Says GF needs to keep sidewalks open for disabled & pedestrians

tered with a growing clutter of tables, chairs, barriers, flower pots and advertising signs. They bear no resemblance to normal sidewalks and instead resemble pedestrian obstacle courses.

Good sidewalk design provides many community benefits including: Public safety, quality of life, economic growth and environmental benefits.

According to the National Association of City Transportation Engineers, prevailing design guidelines should include a "frontage zone" for sidewalk cafes; a pedestrian 'through zone" which is an ACCESSIBLE 5- to 7-foot-wide smooth unobstructed pathway; and an "enhancement/buffer zone" used for trees, street lights, street signs, benches and other infrastructure.

In downtown Glens Falls only the

"frontage zone" and the "enhancement/ buffer zone" currently exist on sidewalks, especially during the late afternoon and evening hours.

There are two senior living facilities in the immediate downtown Glens Falls area and seniors especially need safe sidewalks.

It is irresponsible of city government to issue downtown merchants "outside dining permits" without any conditions requiring compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) or the maintenance at all times of a 5- to 7-foot-wide unobstructed pedestrian corridor.

The current sidewalk clutter is not only a violation of the ADA, but it also creates unsafe conditions for seniors, those in wheel chairs, those pushing strollers, those with disabilities and the general walking public.

The primary responsibility of Glens Falls city government is to provide a safe infrastructure for pedestrians and diners alike. While our Government Officials do an overall great job, the downtown Glens Falls sidewalks are often cluttered by downtown merchants, preventing safe pedestrian access. This needs to be corrected.

week, but this year his family couldn't join him. "We had made the decision that if you are not part of the camp session that it is going to be off limits for being on site."

In terms of Double H returning to normalcy, he says, "I think it's premature to think about right now. Just because I feel like there's still a lot of unknowns, especially with the Delta variant coming out. it's going to be very difficult to assess what the future holds."

But Dr. Woll said the heightened safety protocols don't stop the kids' fun.

"I feel like this past year, for schooling and everything, they're so used to the mask and so used to the social distancing, that they are not affected by the limited size and the restrictions that we have in place right now. They're still having a great experience. And that was really good

to see. We have them isolated to the cabin — not their physical cabin, but the cabin as a group of children."

There are 10 kids to a cabin.

"Some of the activities, they are modified to make sure that there is no intermingling of the cabins. For example...the talent show would usually be everybody in an auditorium sitting together and the performer is up on stage. And now we are doing it in a kind of isolated section, either outdoors where they can all be spread out. Or in physically separate locations with a live stream of the performer."

Dr. Woll's vision for the future? "What I foresee is that we're just going to grow our camper population...that we can serve and safely serve. I think with the advancement of a lot of medical technologies and diagnostics, I think that it will allow us to safely serve them as we learn more and more about these diseases.'

Not for sale: The Bay-Glen wedge; GF targets for park

The \$15-million, 333 Glen property listing that features the signature 10-story 1973 building popularly known as "the Travelers building" does not include the green "wedge" of lawn across Bay Street from the Civil War monument.

The City approved subdivision of that roughly three-quarter acre parcel from the property almost a year ago. Developer Chris Patten had a contract to buy hoping to build, first, a mixed-use project, and then, in the face of opposition, apartments.

That project is apparently now off the table while Mr. Patten pursues a similar project but on land behind Heritage Apartments (the former Glens Falls Junior High School) three blocks north.

Mayor Dan Hall is seeking to acquire the "green wedge" of property for a new park. He says it will ideally be funded through Glens Falls's \$10 million Downtown Revitalization Initiative state grant. That effort is on hold, awaiting state approval. — Cathy DeDe



building manager," however, he adds.

'To be at 95 percent is a good occupancy," he says. "For the last five years it's been on an upwards occupancy trend."

"There's a lot of volatility in the office market right now," Mr. Levack says. Even as businesses are downsizing office space, "that creates tenants in the market," looking for different space or to reconfigure the spaces they currently occupy to accommodate the downsizing, he said.

Mr. Levack said he just closed Friday on the \$2,850,000 sale of a 36,000 square-foot Schermerhorn property, a mixed professional-medical office building at 25 Willowbrook in Queensbury. The building's listing price was \$2,995,000.

He says he has another high profile downtown building under contract as well. "It's **crazy busy** now," Mr. Levack says.

"I'm grateful for the amount of transactions being done and optimistic for the outlook of the commercial building market here. Urban flight and low interest rates are driving the residential market, and we are seeing that affecting the commercial market as well."

He says that as urban flight brings new home buyers to this market, "I hope, what I see is, they plan on bringing their businesses with them."

Prior to the pandemic, Mr. Levack says, "Glens Falls was seeing good activity," including a 10-year lease with Valor Healthcare, a national Veterans Administration health care provider, at 101 Ridge Street in the former Andritz office complex.

Mr. Levack said a planned full-floor office space for AngioDynamics in 333 Glen had just completed construction, "when everything went on hold...2020 saw very little office movement with expansions or new tenants. Now that business community is becoming very active again."

Mr. Levack has several high-profile commercial properties on the market, includ-






Special Olympics NYS Fall Games here in October

Special Olympics New York and the City of Glens Falls announced that the State Fall Game will return here starting October 22

It will be the first statewide competition for Special Olympics at letes since 2015

for Special Olympics athletes since 2015.

A fall 2020 return to coincide with the event's 50th anniversary was planned, but cancelled due to the pandemic.

"When we had to cancel [in 2020], it broke our hearts," Stacey Hengsterman, President and CEO of Special Olympics New York, told a press conference Monday morning at the Queensbury Hotel.

"I promise you," she continued, "that this is gonna be the best statewide games we have ever had."

Mrs. Hengsterman has a personal connection. Her teenaged son, Alex, is a Special Olympics power lifting athlete. His involvement started after she became Pres-

ident and CEO in 2018.

She says Alex recently shared with her that Special Olympics "changed his life."

"I've seen the impact it's made on my son. He's doing things he never thought he could do."

Mrs. Hengsterman says she wants everyone to know the Special Olympics is an "authentic competition."

Michael Bittel, President and CEO of the Adirondack Regional Chamber of Commerce is the chairman of the games.

He said he aims for the contest to "show-case the area," but "most importantly, to serve and love our athletes."

"If you've never been to a Games, you're gonna be blown away."

Mr. Bittel also asked for public support. "We need you to come and volunteer, we need you beforehand, we need you during the Games and we need your financial support as well to make these Games a reality."

Mrs. Hengsterman said, "We're committed to not let money stop us." She says they need to raise at least \$50,000 more for the games and need at least 2,000 volunteers.


Nearly 1,300 athletes, coaches and families are expected to attend in October.

Crandall Park Beautification also improves eco-habitat, aids pollinators

Crandall Park's Beautification Committee advises and assists the City of Glens Falls in the management of its largest park. Despite setbacks caused by Covid, the committee has helped bring high-profile sport and exercise improvements to our crown jewel this year — new tennis, pickle ball and basketball courts, a disc golf course, and a splash pad.

In tandem with those improvements the committee's Garden for Wildlife group has quietly been working to enhance the jewel's environmental setting.

Four years ago, these volunteers realized that the park already met most of the standards for the National Wildlife Federation's approval as a Wildlife Habitat.

Years of tending by the city's public works crews, earlier committees and individuals meant it had a good combination of woodland, water and open space that supports healthy plants, birds, small critters, and insects — the living resources needed to maintain the park's overall health.

The **national** Garden for Wildlife **program officially certified the park** as an eco-friendly habitat in October of 2018.

The goal is to combat effects of climate change and pollution by raising awareness and strengthening the resources already in place. Whenever possible, committee members join hands with Warren County's **Soil and Water Conservation District** to plant carefully selected trees and shrubs.

In the fall of 2019, the group, led by Erika Schielke, an ecologist in Skidmore College's Biology Department, turned out to till, mulch and plant the foundation for a new pollinator garden at the western edge of the Crandall ponds' parking lot.

Not long afterward, Covid 19 struck, but following a typical North Country winter, the Beautification Committee uncrossed dozens of fingers. Their work had yielded a **bumper crop of colorful pollinator**

plants.

Milkweed, bee balm, Black-eyed Susan and others had taken hold under ice and snow. Before long, a variety of airborne and land-roving insects started arriving to reap the rewards. In a dark time, everything had come together to help beautify one corner of the park.

This spring and summer the garden has been carefully tended to demonstrate what can be done by groups and individuals seeking to protect the environment. (A now-famous example on a larger scale, bees not only provide honey but pollinate essential crops throughout the world.)

The Crandall Park site has nurtured a small number of **Monarch butterflies** over the past two summers, and the committee is hopeful that it can play a supporting role in the **National Wildlife Fund's campaign** to reverse what has been a worrisome decline in Monarch numbers. In



the western U.S., the Monarch population has almost disappeared.

Committee: Help us identify nice gardens

Jim O'Hara adds: Anyone out for a walk through the neighborhoods of Glens Falls, Queensbury or most of Warren County's towns and villages this summer will easily spot colorful floral displays that might be identified as either butterfly or pollinator gardens.


They testify to their owners' limitless imagination and creativity — and they reflect the human need to connect with the natural world.

DEC: Longhorn beetle search — in your pool

New York State DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos encouraged pool owners to participate in DEC's annual Asian Longhorned Beetle Swimming Pool Survey.

During late summer, Asian longhorned beetles (ALB) emerge as adults and are active outside of their host tree. The survey's goal is to locate infestations before they cause serious damage to trees.

ALB are wood-boring beetles native to Asia that were accidentally introduced to the United States through wood-packing materials. They attack a variety of hardwoods, including maples, birches, and willows, among others, and have caused the death of hundreds of thousands of trees across the country.

ALB are 1.5 inches long, black with white spots, and have black and white antennae. They leave dime-sized round exit holes in host trees, and create sawdust-like material that collects on and around trees.

From now until swimming pools are closed for the season, DEC asks pool owners to periodically check their filters for insects that resemble ALB, and report suspects either by emailing photos to foresthealth@dec.ny.gov or mailing insects to DEC's Forest Health Diagnostics Lab at 108 Game Farm Road, Delmar, NY 12054, Attn: Liam Somers.

Qby. grad **Keenan Slusher** covers Olympics again for NBC, from Connecticut

Queensbury graduate Keenan Slusher is in his sixth year working the Summer Olympics in Japan.

While he's not "on the spot" in Tokyo, he says he's technically still on the spot, as a digital and television producer-editor for NBCSports.com, NBCOlympics.com and the new Peacock platform.

He works remotely out of a Marriott Hotel in Stamford, Connecticut, NBC's base.

Mr. Slusher, who graduated Queensbury in 2006, already has a long Olympics history of his own.

"I started as an intern as a senior at Ithaca College during the 2010 Vancouver Olympics and was a 'runner' at the Whistler-Creekside venue for alpine skiing.'

He was hired by NBC, and says he has since covered the London 2012, Sochi 2014, Rio 2016, PyeongChang 2018, "and now Tokyo" Olympics that he still lists as "2020," though it was delayed for Covid.

From his standpoint, he says Covid simply means the remote crew is even more spread out than usual.

"It's quite an undertaking, with roughly

3,500 people working in unison on the Olympics project, and it's naturally necessary that we as a company operate within proper protocols, which has caused everyone to be a bit more 'spread out' compared to past years."

He calls it "a marathon, not a sprint." He says each of the 18 days, July 22 to August 8, is "a mini Olympics in its own right. The shifts I work are from at least 3 p.m. to 3 a.m. daily (Eastern Standard Time), due to the 13-hour time difference in Tokyo."

Some highlights, in Mr. Slusher's view: 'There are too many to name just one, but so far some of my favorites include:

- · USA's Caeleb Dressel's emotional interaction with his wife/family after winning his first individual gold in the 100m free-
- Mutaz Essa Barshim of Qatar and Gianmarco Tamberi of Italy deciding to share the gold medal in men's high jump and their emotional celebration that followed as co-Olympic champions due to an obscure rule
- Sifan Hassan of the Netherlands falling during her 1500m heat only to pick herself up and not only win the heat but also the gold medal in the final
- USA's Isaiah Jewett and Nijel Amos of Botswana falling during the men's 800m semifinal and helping each other to their feet before putting their arms around each other and finishing together

• And of course, Suni Lee stepping in for Simone Biles and stepping up to win the all-around title in women's gymnastics.

Mr. Slusher says he was "as surprised as the next person" that Ms. Biles stepped away for mental health reasons, but applauded her decision and says "it was great" to watch her return to competition

on the balance beam.

He says, "I think the most difficult part of the 2020 Tokyo Olympics athletes endured was the year delay in competition. These finely-tuned athletes are so used to regimented schedules for training and it couldn't have been easy to have that wrench thrown into their preparations."

As for the Covid ban on crowds, he says, "While it's not ideal to have limited spectators at events, or in some cases none at all, I think technology has helped create some great 'reactionary moments' between athletes and their families/supporters immediately after competition that we otherwise wouldn't have gotten to see."

That has offered "a unique aspect to 27 these Tokyo Olympics," he says.

Mr. Slusher adds, "Now, more than ever, people need things to look forward to and signs of hope and light.

"To me, some of the indelible moments listed above provide these moments and epitomize what the Olympics are all about. Hard work. Persistence. Graciousness. Empathy. Compassion. Teamwork...

The Olympics represent the best we're capable of if we work together toward common goals and ideals. We should all be 🗷 striving to go Citius, Altius, Fortius ('Faster, Higher, Stronger') together as neighbors, as Americans, as human beings and members of this global society.'

Of his own experience covering sports for NBC during the pandemic, Mr. Slusher says, "Aside from the two weeks where all sports pretty much shut down during March 2020, it's been largely status quo since then. In fact, I/we've probably been as busy as ever over these last nearly 20 months.

He notes, "I fully recognize and am sensitive to the fact that everyone has a different experience and perspective as a result of the pandemic.'

Specifically of the Olympics, he adds, "Understandably it's a lot of hard work, time, and energy, but it can also be a lot of fun as well! It feels like a privilege each and every time getting to work on something that's so much bigger than yourself."

Mr. Slusher's message home: "Thanks for watching and following along and for your continued support, and we'll see you in seven short months for the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing!"

LG's Gem Island, **Bessie Stone's 40**-year haven

Editor's note: This is the 25th anniversary of when the late Frank Leonbruno began writing — and The Chronicle began publishing — the series of articles that became his classic book Lake George Reflections: Island **History and Lore.** This summer we are reprinting weekly chapters with the permission of Frank's daughters Gail and

GEM ISLAND is a state-owned island richly deserving of its name. It truly is a gem sparkling in the waters of Lake George. It is a tiny island, measuring only about onethird of an acre.

This small size, however, did not deter D. J. Brown of Caldwell (now the town of Lake George) from building a cottage on it in about **1889**. Nestled just to the north is an even smaller jewel, Little Gem Island.

Gem Island is one of my favorites. Perhaps it is because of my long-time acquaintance with Elizabeth Stone, who was a nurse at Eddy Memorial Hospital in Troy. Bessie Stone camped on the island for more than 40 years and even had a permanent tent platform there.

After her husband died, she continued to camp on Gem, accompanied by Valenti, a friend and schoolteacher.

Bessie brought Jean along because, although she loved camping and she loved Gem, she was afraid to stay on the island alone overnight. Once, when Jean had to leave, Bessie paddled over to Glen Island in her 1929 Old Town canoe in the middle of the night simply to be near other human beings. You can imagine our surprise when we found her the next morning asleep in the telephone booth on Glen Island.



During the last few years of Bessie's stay on Gem, my wife Betty and I let her sleep on the enclosed porch at our Glen Island cabin. She came to the island just before dark and left each morning at dawn. It was always a pleasure to have her stay with us.

Finally old age crept up on Bessie and she reluctantly gave up her annual camping trip. The old-time campers who had known her over the years gave her a surprise farewell party, attended by many of her friends from far and near.

All of us who knew her were saddened to hear of her death in 1960, but we are consoled by the thought that she is surely in Heaven smiling down upon us.

Gem Island will never be the same without Bessie. If islands could speak, Gem would surely say, "Bessie, you cared for me, you were my very best tenant." The apple tree that Bessie planted on the island still bears little green apples, the fruits of her labor and of her love for the island..
