Pilot Knob Marina sold

After 35 years, Nick Barber and Mike Smith have sold Pilot Knob Marina on Lake George to John "JD" Donnelly, a Massachusetts healthcare software entrepreneur, for just under \$3-million.

Mr. Donnelly, 52, interviewed Tuesday from his Massachusetts corporate office via Zoom, said of the purchase, "I'm built for this." He said he's been coming

to Lake George as "long as I can remember, since I was about yea high. My parents had a place up on Cleverdale, Warner Bay."

He said he's committed to the marina and expanding its operations. "I don't want to see condos on this property as long as I am sitting behind the wheel," the Albany Business Review quoted him.

Pilot Knob Marina encompasses a quick-launch and service facility on the lake and extensive storage areas nearby.

It also has a sales showroom on Route 149 in Queensbury that Mr. Donnelly indicated immediate plans to replace.

"That's imperative," he told The Chronicle. "This is what I'm excited about."

He said he wants it to make an Adirondack statement. "My family has a business," Mr. Donnelly said. "You ever buy a gun from Cabela's or Bass Pro Shop and see those little red locks? Trigger locks on the gun itself. Every single one of those locks my family sold to Cabela's.

"...So you walk into those stores, and those big pillars when you come in — that feel





□ 500+ athletes: **Special Olympics Fall Games here** on Oct. 22 & 23

The Glens Falls region will host Special $\,$ Olympics' New York's 2021 Fall Games Friday and Saturday, Oct. 22 & 23.

'There's going to be about 500 athletes, and 150 coaches from all across the state," Casey Vattimo, Senior VP, External Relations for Special Olympics New York told The Chronicle. "It'll be a great

State Fall Games will be the first statelevel competition we have been able to offer athletes since before the pandemic and our first Fall Games in six years."

They still seek volunteers.

"There's a bunch of different jobs available at the website," Ms. Vattimo said, including "scorekeepers, timers.

"The athlete escorts which we call the marshals" and a "safety squad" to disin-

fect surfaces and equipment.
"And golf, we need golf caddies. Kind of a fun one.

"Thursday is ideally when we would like volunteers registered so that we can put them where we have the most need."

"We will have availability for walkin volunteers...but they'll have to either show proof of vaccination or take a rapid test on site...That's why we're asking for

them to do all that in advance."
But regardless, "we do have enough volunteers to make it happen for our athletes," she said.

Spectrum gives \$50,000, laptops, job training, more

Moreau Community Center has received \$50,000 through Spectrum Community Assist, which Spectrum said is its "new, five-year, \$30 million philanthropic initiative to revitalize local community centers and invest in job training programs in rural and urban underserved communities where Spectrum operates."

The partnership is to kick-of on Saturday, Oct. 23, Spectrum said, with a "revitalization event" at the center, where Spectrum employees and community volunteers will provide repairs "and other physical improvements" to the facility.

Opening ceremony begins at 8:25 a.m. "Community centers like Moreau Community Center are hallmarks of our neighborhoods, where people go for support, shared experiences and develop new job skills or find new employment,"

said Rahman Khan in a press release. He is Vice President of Community Impact for Charter Communications, which operates Spectrum's Internet, TV, Mobile and Voice products, said company info.

It said the \$50,000 will be used to develop a job skills training program and facility improvements.

Spectrum employee volunteers will spend Saturday "landscaping, painting, building shelves and desks and other interior projects," said the press release.

"Additionally, because broadband is a critical component of a community center's infrastructure, Spectrum will offer Moreau Community Center its 1 Gig service at no charge for the life of the program" and will donate 25 new laptops for training and technology programs.
It said Moreau Community Center will

dedicate their updated training and tech room with the Spectrum name.

Donna Nichols, the facility's Executive Director, was quoted: "Moreau Community Center is thrilled to be partnering with Spectrum to provide much-needed services in our community."

pinning faster all the time

The pace of change only keeps accelerating.

With the sale of Pilot Knob Marina, so soon after the sale of F.R. Smith & Sons Marina, two of Lake George's oldest, locally owned marinas have changed hands. Giving up the reins are people I've known for

several decades and, in the case of Pilot Knob Marina co-owner Nick Barber, virtually all my life. He graduated a year ahead of me from Glens Falls High

Long-time Chronicle readers may remember my telling you that

Nick was The Chronicle's first landlord. In the summer of 1980 we were desperate for affordable space. Yielding to my plea, he rented us the back-half second-floor in the old Braydon & Chapman building that now houses Domino Pizza on the first floor. It didn't have heat, electricity, plumbing. He charged us \$100 a month. Nick said he'd never raise the rent for as long as he owned the building, but we had to make any improvements.

This was all done on a handshake. No lease. I thought we'd be there for a year and then be such a rollicking success that we'd buy our own building.
Instead we were there nearly six years. At \$100 a

month. Assuming this is how Nick did business generally, it's no wonder that he and his partner Mike Smith had such a successful 35-year run with the marina.

Wishing the same for new owner JD Donnelly, whom I interviewed for the story on our front page this week.

Welcome Chris Liggio to The Chronicle staff. The South High grad answered our call for a part-time assistant in preparing our comprehensive Calendar of Events. Before he joined *The Chronicle*, Chris was an active user of the calendar. He talks about the band he and his friends caught at Mean Max strictly because he'd seen our calendar listing for it.

This year *The Chronicle* has been harder to do than it was last year, which at first puzzled me because last year the world was caught in a state of Covid paralysis.

What I finally realized is that this year is harder because so much more stuff is going on, whereas last year our Managing Editor Cathy DeDe was able to do both the calendar and news articles because the calendar was short. It's not short anymore.

We're glad to have Chris aboard to help us keep pace. Even with the addition of Chris and our son Zander, we're still working with pretty much a skeleton crew. But we're viable, financially sound, making headway.

Haven't had much time to watch football this season, but I did catch the end of Monday night's Buffalo Bills-Tennessee Titans NFL game. The Bills made a great drive in the last two minutes and on fourth down with seconds left, were a yard away from a first down and two yards away from a touchdown. Or they could tie the game by kicking a short field goal. Coach Sean McDermott threw caution to the wind and went for the win. Quarterback Josh Allen didn't make it. Bills lost.

I'm a Bills fan but I'm fine with it. Still early in the season. Now 3-2 instead of 4-1. Good show of confidence. Build on it.

I watched the post-game long enough to see Titan running back Derrick Henry (he rushed for 143 yards including one touchdown run of 76 yards) interviewed by Lisa Salter. 





Luzerne politics: Merlino planned to retire, but attacked, he runs as write-in

At 77 and in his 16th year as Lake Luzerne Town Supervisor, Gene Merlino wasn't planning to run for re-election.

Councilman Dan Waterhouse, Mr. Merlino's long-time deputy supervisor, had the Republican nomination and no foe in November.

Then everything changed. In early August, all four councilmen - Mr. Waterhouse, Mike Fazio, Paul Lewandowski and Dave O'Neal — issued a vote of no confidence in Mr. Merlino. They asked the State Comptroller to investigate him

for alleged, vast, serious wrongdoing.

The comptroller's report is not expect-

ed in time for the Nov. 2 election.

Mr. Fazio says, "All these allegations have come from members of the public, not the board itself. We just acted upon the information that was given to us....

We could have easily taken all these allegations that were handed to us, and just left them under the table and just rode it out.

"Gene would have been done in September, Dan would have been supervisor, everything would have been hunky dory. And we could have moved forward. But we knew that wasn't the right thing to

"So we took it upon ourselves to open the can of worms and let the worms out."

of the week. Now, I'm not a saint. I'm going to tell you...I did things in the gray area. I'm not ashamed of it. But I've never lost that town one penny in any decision I made. And I never put one penny in my pocket."

Mr. Waterhouse acknowledges that Lake Luzerne's finances are "strong, they're very strong. We are pretty much debt free except for a town garage that we inherited from Larry Bennett. There's still a million dollars on that. But besides that the town finances are pretty good."

Mr. Merlino said, "The town had no tax increase for the last five years. All the employees got a 3% raise the last nine years. We're in great shape. We hardly have any debt. We have that town hall, we don't owe a dime on it."

The allegations against Mr. Merlino were detailed in a long, devastating article in *The Post-Star*.

Mr. Merlino's litany of alleged misdeeds include selling a town boat and purchasing, without town approval, another boat that might have been stolen; improperly awarding contracts that may have benefitted cronies and vendors of his bed & breakfast business; putting people wrongly on the payroll; and failing to

oversee overtime expenses and to document discipline for Town employees.

Mr. Fazio says, "Gene can be mad at



now is back in his foxhole, telling everybody else how wrong they are for doing the right thing and taking the information that he provided and bubbling it up to the proper authorities....

"I don't know how we can be faulted for that. But you know, with a small town, everybody has their own opinion."


Mr. Fazio says, "My take on it is the people who have benefited the most from Gene's malfeasance are the ones that are standing up for him, the most vehement-

The accusation is that Mr. Merlino favors Mr. Waterhouse because he also supplies the Merlinos' bed and breakfast.

"They took away my pride," Mr. Merlino says of his foes. "For a while there I was hiding in sunglasses and mask to go to the post office. I didn't want anybody to see me. I was so embarrassed.

Meanwhile, he had collapsed at a town board meeting last spring and spent months on medical leave. Now he's back. He's resumed his duties as supervisor —

and plans a write-in campaign to win a ninth term — against Mr. Waterhouse.

"I'm an old Marine," says Mr. Merlino. "And we're taught to go over that hill; if you get killed, you're doing it for your

"If I pass out at a board meeting again, I'm doing it for my town. And that's just how I feel."

Mr. Merlino removed Mr. Waterhouse as his Deputy Supervisor and named Pamela Petteys to replace him. The Deputy Supervisor need not be an elected official.

Ms. Pettevs is now running for the town board on a write-in slate that includes three council candidates and Mr. Merlino.

When The Chronicle interviewed Mr. Merlino for this story last month, he predicted of the election outcome, "I'll win by

Queensbury's At-Large race: 5 vie for 4 seats on Warren County Board

Five candidates — the four Republican incumbents and one Democratic challenger — seek Queensbury's four at-large supervisor seats on the Warren County Board in the Nov. 2 general election.

Early voting begins Saturday, Oct. 23. The race has become hot and controversial, but here's a quieter take.

The incumbent Republicans are Doug Beaty, Brad Magowan, Rachel Seeber and Mike Wild. The Democratic challenger is Brent McDevitt.

Beaty, Magowan and Seeber are also running on a separate Team Queensbury line. The Conservative line is held by Wild and McDevitt.

The Chronicle talked with the candidates.

Brad Magowan, 58, says, "I'm going for my third term of being the people's voice. My whole motto for the elections has been 'A New Voice,' 'Your Voice,' and 'Keep Your Voice."

"I'm following what the people want — working with Democrats, Republicans, Independents and Conservatives on the matters that concern our constituents is the most important thing, listening to what people say."

What's he proud of? "It's been the toughest couple of years with the pandemic, and there are a lot of confusions, just to follow through with everything that needs to be done," said Mr. Magowan.

"I just about go to every committee meeting, because that's where everything happens, and the best place to discuss things."

"The main concern is the health of your constituents throughout the county, and keeping the economy going. It's why the board has pulled together behind Rachel Seeber as our chairwoman. A large group of us are working wonderfully together."

Despite notable friction on the board, Mr. Magowan says, "There are a lot of us working together.

"My whole belief is in coming together with people on both sides of the line. Let us show you the example of how to do it.

"Stop this mudslinging. I'm not a politician. I'm a voice. I'm proud of the direction our board is going."

About the Team Queensbury ballot line, Mr. Magowan said: "It was a wonderful experience, going out and talking to people who are not in your party. People were happy to have another line to

Mike Wild, 66, seeking a third term as At-Large Supervisor, said, "I feel pretty confident that I relate pretty well to constituents." He's a retired customer manager for General Electric.

What's he proud of? In 2020, as thenchair of the County's Economic Development committee, Mr. Wild says he was instrumental in creating a Countywide economic recovery group in response to the Covid pandemic.

"Bringing together representatives from consulting firms, members of the private and public sectors, with the EDC, economic development groups, the Industrial Development Agency, the Lake George Chamber, to address economic recovery together, as one group."

together, as one group."
Mr. Wild says, "I continue precisely because we still have a lot of challenges: Housing, decent jobs, full employment but 1,000 job openings. How do we deal with this? Transportation, health care: We have big challenges in front of us still."



change the board, if I think something is going in a wrong direction. My voice counts. I can ask questions that will move the board, going down a path.

"There is consequence to every law you make, sometimes unintended," Mr. Wild says. He cites discussions on the proposed county law requiring septic system inspections when properties near water bodies are sold, noting that some municipalities have their own laws and the Lake George Park Commission is considering similar efforts.

Mr. Wild is as the lone Republican candidate who is not on the Team Queensbury line. "I wasn't asked to be part of that," he said, adding that it's likely because he sought and received the Conservative Party endorsement, which the others did not have.

At the County Board, he said, "There is definitely some divisiveness, but we are still getting the county's business done.

"For me, I've won and lost arguments. Okay: Move on. Others are not so quick to move on. It's not a job about making money. It's an effort for the community.

"I wish more people would get involved. We make the best decisions we can when we hear from the most people," he said, as when the County's Meal Sites for seniors were threatened by supply chain and staffing issues.

Doug Beaty, 66, seeks his fifth term as At-Large Supervisor. He works part-time for Taylor and Leonard Insurance Agency, "but I'm basically retired," from having been a corporate vice president for a national company.

"I think of myself as a public servant, not a politician," Mr. Beaty said.

"I have the most independent voting record on the board. I couldn't be prouder of my record. There is not one vote I would have changed."

He says of the Queensbury race, "I suspect the incumbents will all win, but you never know. I feel confident the job I've done will be rewarded."

Mr. Beaty said, "I've presided over the most committee meetings of any supervisor on the board this year, as head of Government Operations, and the Finance Committee," as well as taking a rotating turn, he said, at the Executive Committee, a "catch-all" entity that rarely meets.

"Our job is to respond to the people, to seniors seeking help and special ed. kids.

"That's my passion, Special Olympics. We gave \$50,000 in occupancy tax to Special Olympics. I want to know why we can't get them a three-year contract so they don't have to come and ask every year. That's how I think."

"We are having an outstanding year," Mr. Beaty says. "Financially we are in great shape. Despite three or four obstructionists we're getting along great.

"I go to lunch with the other party twice a month. Claudia (Braymer), two or three times a month we sit down. I work with anybody who wants to do better for the residents of this County."

Ms. Braymer, Glens Falls Ward 3 Supervisor, is the county board's Democratic minority leader, as Mr. Beaty is the Republican majority leader, both designated by county board chair Rachel Seeber,

Mr. Beaty says, "I've never been more pleased working, especially with some of the women in leadership positions now, because they didn't get the opportunities. They are such hard workers and so dedicated. A few obstructionists are trying to throw mud, but we are better than that in Queensbury and Warren County.'

Brent McDevitt, 49, owns National Commercial Solar Advisors.

What are his chances to break through? "I would think my chances are good, but I do know voter makeup favors Republicans in terms of registration.

"It's an uphill push, but as demonstrated by (Queensbury Town Supervisor) John Strough, it is doable for good Democrats to win. And I have the Warren County Conservative endorsement as well. With a positive message and a good campaign, it is doable."

"Politics, fortunately or unfortunately, is in my DNA from a young age," says Mr. McDevitt, whose father Peter represents Glens Falls Ward 2 on the county board.

"I love our area. I've served on the Town Zoning Board of Appeals. I think the time is right to put my toe in the pool. I want to get involved and bring good ideas and issues forward for the town on the County

Mr. McDevitt says his ads — that some term negative - are "fact-based," regarding such board issues as creation this year of paid Majority and Minority positions. "I think it's for the voters to decide."

"The Board of Supervisors, some on the County level are great Republicans doing a fabulous job for their respective communities. I'm an issues guy. I've voted for many a Republican in my life."

"Unfortunately, there's been some infighting and a lack of transparency on the board. If fortunate enough to be elected my mission is to change some things I believe need to be changed."

"Politics is a full contact sport," Mr. McDevitt says. "I want to serve the Town. Since January, how they are talking to each other on the Board, it's a new kind of low? What happens when people stop having an ability to communicate?"

We live in a beautiful community, fairly strong tax base, good school system, SUNY Adirondack, a wonderful trail system and bikeways, a quality of life that is second to none. I would focus on the referenced deficits that could be done better on a county level, to tweak, modify, to be sure we will be a successful community going forward."

over eight years, first in 2013, with one term away when she unsuccessfully challenged incumbent John Strough for town supervisor. (He is running unopposed this year for re-election.)

As chair of the Warren County Board of Supervisors this year, Ms. Seeber says, "My three goals — I wanted to make sure we were present in the community's life, accessible, and grateful.

"In a world where people think government is either not enough or too much, I want to ask, where can we be a good partner? That takes not sitting behind a desk

"I believe, when I run for At-Large, that's my performance evaluation. I hope the community says I've earned another term

"One of the most valuable perspectives I've gained is the accountability to committing myself to fierce advocacy, to utilize what I've learned since I worked for the County in the department of victim advocacy.

"We need, now more then ever, factual, accurate and timely information to the public. I think this county has really stepped up at a time when people don't typically trust government."

Successes? "Over the last few years, hiring a public information officer, working on accountability and return on investment on the Occupancy Tax. We have a new updated scoring sheet and system with metrics to evaluate that.

should be taken against Peter McDevitt by the Board.

Now the story doesn't end. Both Peter and his son, Brent McDevitt, went to the NY State Police and Brent filed a harassment complaint against Mr. Whitehead. To date there apparently will be no criminal action taken on this false complaint. 

like 'I'm in a great store' — that's the kind of thing that I hope to portray. So it's something that fits in the lake, it's visually appealing.

"People want to go into a store like that. I mean, think about driving on 149

and seeing a place like that. looks like it belongs there.'

Donnelly Mr. said he'll continue to sell Chaparral boats and Arctic Cat snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles.

"I got some numbers from **Arctic** Cat," he said. "We have an opportunity to grow tenfold. That's what thinking they're from the current position today."

John 'JD' Donnelly is CEO of Front-RunnerHC, a health software company in Plymouth, Mass. And about Chap-

paral? "I hate to say this as a boat guy, but I wasn't as intimately familiar with it as I am now," Mr. Donnelly said. "It's a nice boat. I mean, I think it gives Cobalt a run for the money if you want my honest opinion. They're one of the biggest selling brands,

"I'm excited," he added. "They were not going to give me the brand in the beginning. I had to sell them on the idea of what I'm going to do. And I laid out my business plan for them. And they were pretty excited."

At the marina itself, Mr. Donnelly said, "you probably won't see many visual changes, because it's going to take us a while to put together the business plan of what we want to do...But it's all going to be about customer service.

He said, "The marina needs an upgrade, right? So Nick and Mike did it, ran a beautiful business, they had over 7,000 customers in the database. If you go on Google or any of those things you can see they got tremendously high marks with it.

"But what I saw in the business and what I love; it's kind of like an old boat, like an old Chris Craft. It's sort of just sitting there and vou're like...when it's done it'll be a pretty boat... You can turn it into something really nice.'

He said he retained the Pilot Knob **Marina staff** with plans to increase it.

"I sat down with them when we bought the place and I said all right, what do you need? Who do we need? Let's let's make sure that we're going to be successful. And they stepped up....

"Ann [Clugstone], who runs the marina. I said, All right. You're manager of the marina today. Congratulations, you just got a promotion. Let's hire somebody to help you.'

"And Ron [Ristau], who runs the store up there [on Route 149], Chaparral and Arctic Cat were saying he's fantastic. So again, what do you need, Ron? Let's hire. I said to him, pick your favorite customer and offer him a job. Right? That guy that you want to work with every day."

Mr. Donnelly said, "When I started my career early on, somebody said to me, your business will never be successful if you work in it...versus on it, right?

"So many owners get lost in the **business.** I gotta sweep the floor, I gotta, you know, answer the phone. I gotta order paper for the fax machine, when they should be focusing on if the customer's happy, you know, do I need to expand this business, do I have the right benefits for my employees -things that are important to helping the organization move forward.'

He said, "I'm not going to be working in the business...I'll be there to answer questions, but you won't find me in an engine room or something. So I'll be making sure that those guys are successful."

Mr. Donnelly said of entrepreneurship, "it's in the DNA, my friend. You can't teach it, I don't think."

He said when he was 10 years old, "my parents bought me a Boston Whaler. And

we were on the Connecticut shore, and there was an island in front of us called Duck Island. And all the boats used to come in there so you get 30, 40 boats on the weekend used to anchor there.

"Well, they didn't want to go in to get ice and coffee and have their trash [removed] so I concocted this idea as a kid to run out to the boats on Saturday and Sunday.

"And I was a little kid, so they probably just bought it out of mercy. But I'd make 50, 100 bucks a weekend and throw it in the coffee can. Little things like that."

He said his "parents from the 70's they were like 'Go, do your thing.' They just wanted me to go have fun, experience

Mr. Donnelly said he and his wife Christine have other business plans here. "I've been married 22 years. We're a good team...She knows this is important to me. She supports me wholeheartedly.

"She wanted to obviously do some other things, start an antique store. Obviously, the Adirondacks are a beautiful place to do that. So if we can create some sort of side business where we can marry the two together it'd be nice....
"We're looking at other business oppor-

tunities up there. I didn't want to mention the actual businesses that we're buying but we're planning on purchasing some other businesses here pretty quickly and kind of building a bigger entity, you know.

Mr. Donnelly said he grew up in Kensington, Connecticut, outside of Hartford, and received an electrical engineering degree from University of Vermont.

He has founded two businesses.

The first, TeraHealth in Plymouth, Mass., he founded in 1996 and sold to MPV Inc. in 2008, which sold less than two years later to Experian, said the Business Review.

In 2010 Mr. Donnelly founded and remains CEO of FrontRunnerHC, a health software company that he said has 81 employees and helps manage finances in health care applications.

Its website says, "We empower health-care facilities and independent labs to capure the correct insurance copay, and patient data right from the start so they can expedite billing and get reimbursed for all services performed."

"COVID is a perfect example," Mr. Donnelly said of the service they provide. "You know, everybody's running off getting COVID tests...And a lot of times,... nobody put in their insurance... when really Blue Cross is on the hook...So we're making sure that Blue Cross is paying for those tests versus us taxpayers.

Unfortunately for the Thunder, Read-


ing came to play tonight.
