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AngioDynamics to stay in Qby.

AngioDynamics reversed its decision to close locally and will continue some operations — retaining 40% of its current workforce in Queensbury.

Town Supervisor John Strough told *The Chronicle*, "AngioDynamics' new business plan to stay in Queensbury and maintain some of their mid-tech cardio-

vascular and oncology device manufacturing and grow their distribution program out of the same facility is wonderful news for our region. "The Town

of Queensbury stands with our neighbor municipalities in offering whatever assis-

tance AngioDynamics needs to sustain their new business plan.

In January, AngioDynamics said it would close in Glens Falls and Queensbury in 2025 at the cost of 350 jobs.

Saleem Cheeks, VP Communications for AngioDynamics, told *The Chronicle* Tuesday the plan to close was driven by factors including "the hangover from the pandemic" and "workforce challenges we were facing. We couldn't find enough people to work at our facility," he said. Supply chain constraints were also a factor.

"It was a reluctant decision we had to make," Mr. Cheeks said. "We didn't want to leave this area."

He said, "We went back, sharpened our pencils, and put more meat on the bone ...and we were able to come up with a plan that addressed all of those needs in a way that made sense for us to maintain a presence in the area."

^{*}What this plan does is build resiliency in our supply chain, utilizing a very talented workforce, and it allows us to rightsize our footprint in a way that we can fully staff and meet our customer needs and growing demand," he said.

and growing demand," he said. Tuesday, he said, "We met with everyone that works in our facilities in the Warren County area and we talked to them in-person and conveyed the news."

"People were surprised....This update was welcome news," Mr. Cheeks said.

"We see a long-term future here. This is where we're going to be. AngioDynamics was born here...and our growth is going to be driven here."

Mr. Strough said Mr. Cheeks told him "40% of their current workforce" will be retained...I was assured that most of the other 60% will pursue retirement or be deployed within the company elsewhere...

^{*}Because this is part of their new business plan, I was assured that this would be sustainable.

"If help was needed, I assured Mr. Cheeks, the Town Board will work with and help AngioDynamics."

Mr. Cheeks said that when Angio told the Warren County Economic Development Corporation it would be trying to refine its plan, "they made it very clear, 'we want you here, we'll do what it takes to get you here.'" He said Mr. Strough told him time and again: "Whatever you need, please let us know." Mr. Cheeks said, "We've had great part-

Mr. Cheeks said, "We've had great partners in government and in the community, and that definitely helped us know that we not only were wanted, but that we had true partners to help mitigate some of the headwinds that we were experiencing as a business neighbor here in the community."

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State OCM confiscates Exit 17 cannabis crop in Moreau

The Town of Moreau announced on its Facebook page that the cannabis crop at the 63 Spier Falls Road property off of Exit 17 owned by Saratoga Springsbased Shangri-La Real Estate Hold**ings** has been confiscated by the state's Office of Cannabis Management.

The crop has caused consternation among residents and visitors complaining of the odor the plants have given off.


The Facebook post noted that the town has been informed that "the growers have had the cannabis licenses they held in Washington County suspended by OCM."

A representative of OCM told The Chronicle, "An investigation is pending on this matter, and the Office of Cannabis Management cannot comment at this time."

The Chronicle attempted to reach out to a Shangri-La owner for comment and to ask where the company had held cannabis licenses in Washington County, but an email sent to the address a Shangri-La owner provided at a recent Moreau town board meeting came back with a "couldn't be delivered" message.

The Chronicle previously reported that Shangri-La is owned by father-son duo Orson and Devin Klender.

The Town of Moreau became aware of "what appeared to be a growing operation" for cannabis at the Spier Falls Road site back on July 25, The Chronicle previ-



ously reported.

In a letter viewed by *The Chronicle* from Moreau Town Supervisor Jesse Fish to town residents, Mr. Fish cited a letter from OCM to State Senator Jim Tedisco stating that OCM sent investigators to the Spier Falls Road site and issued a cease and desist order on Oct. 10 in reaction to its "operating without an OCM license, in violation of law and regulation.'

That letter said OCM was made aware of the cannabis operation "through public complaints received on Sept. 25 and 27."

But Mr. Fish insisted in his letter that "the town had already begun to take action. The town emailed OCM on July 30. A request for information came from OCM on Aug. 8 and the town provided that on the same day."

Mr Fish also said in the letter that on Oct. 16, a Shangri-La owner stopped in his office and told him that a cease and desist order was in place.

"That order required the operation to stop, mid-harvest, which resulted in the continued cannabis smell in the area," Mr. Fish wrote.

He wrote that two days later he received a call from the Shangri-La owner stating that the cease and desist order had been temporarily lifted by OCM, "so the operation could complete their harvest" by Oct. 23 at the latest.

Mr. Fish noted in his letter that at the Oct. 16 meeting in his office, the Shangri-La owner "acknowledged that the cannabis operation had not received authorization or licensing from OCM to operate."

Mr. Fish closed his letter to residents, "As the town navigates this unexpected and unwelcome situation, I thank you for your continued patience. We are working hard to make sure Moreau residents never have to endure this again."

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



Cynthia Secor of South Glens Falls and sisters Khadijah and Asia Peek of the Albany area plan to open "Triedntru" can-nabis dispensary in South Glens Falls next to Matt Secor Brazilian Jiujitsu at the Glen Gate Shopping Center.

Cynthia Secor is Matt Secor's mother. She and the Peek sisters connected because Khadijah trains with Matt and is a Brazilian Jiujitsu black belt. (Asia is a psychiatrist.)

Khadijah, an attorney and real estate broker, lives in Niskayuna, "and I'm always in South Glens Falls, because I'm always training up there. And I do plan on moving up there. I've just been a little slow about it."

Khadijah previously worked for the New York State Senate on cannabis policy and long aimed to open a dispensary.

"I had been talking to Matt about it for a long time, and he had put me in contact with his mom," she said.

Cynthia is retired after working for 36 years for the New York State Office of People with Developmental Disabilities. "I just wanted to build up something," she says. "I've lived here all my life. So keep

In 2019, "I started at the New York State

about the industry, and I met a lot of realwork that I saw that this was something that I wanted to do," she said.

The Chronicle asked, can they all survive? "Realistically, I don't know if all these dispensaries are going to be successful being so close to each other," Khadijah said. "I think it's going to come down to who has better branding and who has the better business acumen."

"I don't want to say I don't agree with the OCM giving out all of these licenses," she added. "But you also have to be strategic with it — because there's a reason why Apple didn't open up multiple locations, that there's only one Apple store in Crossgates Mall where everyone has

to go to if they have an issue — because they don't want to be in competition with themselves."

A nation finding its way?

I'll spare you any suspense. I won't endorse Trump or Kamala.

I also won't predict who wins. Polls indicate it's so close that it can flip either way. That applies not just to the Presidency but to control of the Senate and House too.

One party or the other may yet make a clean sweep. In a nation as closely divided as we are, that in itself may be perilous.

At least everyone agrees on the big issue: Our democracy

itself is in danger.

But who poses the bigger threat? Who will save U.S.? I have a lifelong friend who wrote me, "Only one ticket wants America to continue as a democracy."

I replied, "Such thinking may get Trump elected." Whatever you think, half the country feels opposite. Dismissing the other side's patriotism powers divide.

Some see Trump and all his voters as racists, bigots, misogynists — haters and "deplorables" who have no decency, no civility, no commitment to democratic standards and norms.

There's no downplaying or dismissing what Trump and his legions did on Jan. 6 — the election outcome denial, the attempt to thwart the democratic transition.

Add to that the unforced errors. Sunday at Trump's Madison Square Garden rally a comedian said "there's literally a floating island of garbage in the middle of the ocean...I think it's called Puerto Rico."

Pretty bad. I thought, *Trump did himself in this time.* "Trump faces a P.R. disaster," headlined Politico.

The New York Times: "Harris Aides Quietly Grow More Bullish...While still cautious, advisers and allies believe that casting Donald Trump as a fascist is working, and that their expansive ground game and appeals on abortion rights may carry the day."

Enter President Biden, who delivered a gift to the GOP on Tuesday. "The only garbage I see floating out there is his supporters," he said.

Elitist condemnation is jet fuel for Trump's campaign. When he won eight years ago, Thomas Sowell, a black man who's an intellectual giant you never heard of because he's a conservative, said Trump's victory "represents the biggest backlash...among smug elites in Western nations, where increasing numbers of ordinary people are showing their anger at where those elites are leading their countries...."

Canada has even turned on Justin Trudeau.

We face so many real issues.

On the home front, Democrats say the economy is great and inflation is over, but angst abounds. The flood of illegal immigrants is increasingly costly and unpopular.

Overseas, the Ukraine war looks like a quagmire, and our sanctions on Russia not only failed to deter Putin, they turned him closer to China and North Korea three nasty players with bad intentions. In the Middle East, Israel is at war on four or five fronts, Iran lurking. Dashed is Trump's Abraham Accords that actually gave hope of headway in Arab-Israel relations.

When Kamala was asked by a friendly inter-

viewer what she would do differently than Joe, she said nothing came to mind. Do voters want more of the same? That may be the crux of this election.

Social issues are also at the center of the fray. Most of America is at least okay if not downright ardent that a woman has the right to decide on an abortion. It's a mighty damaging issue for Republicans.

But some other progressive agenda has turned problematic if not radioactive. Kamala said government should pay for inmates' and illegal immigrants' gender transition surgery. A Trump commercial ends "Kamala cares about they/them. Trump cares about you."

Both sides wield zingers. Trump's "Take America Back" drew the perfect retort: "We Aren't Going Back."

More issues to talk about than we have space for. Highest on my list: Protecting freedom of the press, freedom of speech; curbing the totalitarian state.

I support Rep. Elise Stefanik for re-election. She accomplished something huge and important this term. She laid bare the intolerance, hate and anti-Semitism that have taken hold at Ivy League and other elite and not so elite colleges. She changed the nation's conversation, raised its consciousness.

It's a no for me on New York State's Prop One. I think it will open a pandora's box of lawsuit grounds. *The New York Times* insists it's to guarantee the right to abortion but abortion isn't mentioned, and it's certainly not at risk in New York. We're at too fraught and divided a time to make big changes to the constitution.


"So our edge is going to be making sure we're taking care of the community and taking care of our employees,."

"Plans for a Celebration of Life are **underway on Sunday, Nov. 10**, at The Sandy Hill Arts Center."



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

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
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Ed Pagnotta Jr. **& Bob Dillon** vie for seat on LG Town Council

Republican Ed Pagnotta Jr., 66, and Democrat Bob Dillon, 73, are vying to fill a Lake George Town Council seat. Election Day is Nov. 5.

Mr. Pagnotta is a life-long Lake George resident who graduated from Lake George High School. He was a business teacher at Minerva Central School for 32 years before retiring in 2020. He's owned the Barnsider Smokehouse BBQ restaurant for 30 years.

He earned his Bachelor's degree from Alfred University and an MBA from the College of St. Rose.

Mr. Pagnotta is currently on the town's Downtown Revitalization Initiative committee and sits on the Lake George Regional Chamber of Commerce's board. He served on the Lake George Planning Board for two years in the 80s. When he taught school he was involved with the union and served as Minerva's athletic director from 2017 to 2020.

Mr. Dillon moved to Lake George two years ago. Born and raised in Glens Falls, he graduated from the Northwood School in Lake Placid after attending junior high and high school in the Glens Falls School District and earned a bachelors degree in Business Administration from the University of Colorado Boulder.

Mr. Dillon said he had a "career on Madison Avenue in the television industries" in New York City.

In 2001, he moved to Hartford in Washington County where he served on the Town Council from 2013 to 2019 and was appointed deputy town supervisor.

Some jobs he's held in upstate New York include marketing director of the Lake Placid Film Forum, CEO of Adworkshop, and founder of Adirondack Strategic Marketing

Mr. Pagnotta said that a shrinking school district and lack of affordable

housing in Lake George is a concern.

"In the whole Adirondacks, the school districts are shrinking, and it's really about jobs and affordable housing," he said.

"When there's different projects in front of the board and the planning board, I think that it should be encouraged." He added, "When the projects come to

Lake George, I think we have to really be in tune with what they are offering. Is it expensive condominiums, apartments, or is it really affordable housing?

He suggested "trying to partner with the planning board to look at the zoning for those projects.'

Mr. Dillon said the biggest challenge Lake George faces is figuring out how to house and maintain a work force. He advocates for working with developers to figure out what part of new housing complexes will be affordable for the locals.

"There's got to be a balance," he said. "Otherwise you're just going to price everybody out. And then where do the workers come from?"

He said there's less housing available than there used to be. "Airbnbs are changing what used to be long-term rentals for workforce families and that sort of thing," Mr. Dillon said.

"My whole thing is how we're going to make this community livable and sustainable as we become better and better known" while not getting overdeveloped and too expensive.

"We have one of the greatest communities in the United States, and it's been discovered," Mr. Dillon said.

"And I just don't want to see future generations be priced out and pushed away. That's happened in a lot of areas. We've got to save the best for everyone, not just for the super rich."

Mr. Dillon argues, "It's time to look at a new comprehensive plan," noting that Glens Falls, Queensbury and Warren County are all undertaking new comprehensive plans, so "now would be the perfect time to get one into the works so that these communities can work together."

Mr. Pagnotta emphasized prioritizing tourism in Lake George and being "always on top of our game" in regards to that industry.

"Other tourist areas are trying to evolve and grow, and I think Lake George should keep doing that as well," he said.

He advocated for "using the resources and the land that we have to stimulate and encourage mountain biking, hiking, and things of that nature."

Mr. Dillon urges bipartisanship.

"I think that an all-Republican town board is not a balanced board, and even though I'd be the only Democrat, I still think it would be nice to have somebody that maybe has a little different approach," he said.

Mr. Pagnotta said he feels that he's "more in tune with what's going on" than Mr. Dillon because he's lived in Lake George all his life and raised a family and has a business in town. He said he would strive to be levelheaded and dedicated. "I always try to think out the problem," he said. "I don't want to just say things off the cuff." To campaign, Mr. Pagnotta says, "I'm just trying to go out as much as I can and really go door to door." Mr. Dillon says he's been campaigning by putting up a lot of signs and talking to people one on one.

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

"We're certainly getting calls saying, 'I don't like seeing these people,'" Mayor Collins says, and such comments as "They're loud, they're swearing, they're doing illegal things. I can't

gat things. I can't get to the library with my 12-yearold daughter without exposing her to these people."

The mayor said that from May to September, the police recorded more than 200 blotter calls and police walkthroughs of City Park, including incidence "one of violence" а knife stabbing between two women



acquaintances, both under 18, "over a boyfriend," he said. He did not have details on where that stands now.

Police Chief Jared Smith reported for those five months four arrests for disorderly conduct, two arrests for harassment, six warnings for remaining in the park after dusk, four for open container, three for smoking, and eight arrests on warrants "discovered on routine ID checks."

"But it's not illegal to hang out in that public park all day long," Mayor Collins adds. "It's not illegal to be vulgar. It's not

GF Police Chief: What we can and can't do

Glens Falls Police Chief Jared Smith told *The Chronicle*, via email, that his goal regarding so-called "dayspenders" in Glens Falls City Park "is to protect public safety.

"We are doing this in two ways: We attempt to find services for those who need them and are ready to accept them." Meanwhile, "the record shows that the department is prepared to take law enforcement action when that is appropriate."

Chief Smith said, "A confusing part about disorderly conduct that most don't understand is that there needs to be a victim, a member of the public willing to call, then willing to follow up and go to court to testify to what they witnessed.

"Most of the complaints we receive that are not enforceable are what most people refer to mistakenly as "loitering."

Citing state penal law, he said, "Loitering is not 'hanging out.'...Simply being in the park during the hours that it is open is not illegal." illegal to yell even obscenities at people.

For it to be actionable disorderly conduct, "there has to be a victim. We need to have a person report it," or for an officer to witness the offense first-hand. He adds, "You can't arrest your way out

of this."

The mayor says it's a phenomenon re-

gionally — in Saratoga and Burlington, Vt. — and "in society in general."

Mayor Collins says he interacts with the groups "every day, in the morning and at night," on his way to and from City Hall. He said he calls them out on behavior such as smoking or foul language, moves them along himself if they are in the gazebo and calls in the police to follow **15** up, offers life advice on occasion.

I, the Mayor, are doing" — formally in the case of Police Social Worker Darlene Hafner's daily efforts, and informally in the Mayor's own interactions with the group.

That is saying that we are addressing it," the Mayor says. But I do appreciate that you, community member, are frustrated.

He says, "If you're uncomfortable and you're feeling threatened in any way, call right away. I don't care if it's a legal offense or not. It gets us over there one more time, and we want to be over there, and we want to help you to feel as comfortable as we can.

Can I arrest them for swearing in front of you, or even if it's swearing at you? I can't. And, if they have done something that is arrestable, I need you to help me, fill out a report, and I need you to help me follow up with that."

Not a sanctuary, not comfortable

"We don't want to be a sanctuary city where we're providing services to make this the favorite hangout of all the 600 people that we just identified might be struggling here in Glens Falls, but I also don't want to be that guy who's pushing people, just either putting them in jail or pushing them out of my park to go and just scatter throughout the community, either."

The Mayor hopes to engage social services providers, non-profits, church groups and others "to engage these folks on an ongoing basis," to be ready, "if they've reached a bottom that day, they want help, and they're willing to look in the mirror, that somebody's around that could provide those services.

"I also am hoping maybe it makes them a little uncomfortable.

"I don't want that to be the most comfortable place for them to hang out, but I also don't want to be the person who's rushing them out.

"These folks do exist. They're having a bad day, and they come to hang out with their friends. They just lost their job, they

Library: Welcome to all, but if you break rules, you're out Crandall Public Library Executive Director **Kathy Naftaly** says of individuals hanging out in City Park, and coming into the library to use facilities, Internet, electricity for chargers, and to warm up, "as all people, they are welcome to come in the library, as long as they follow our rules of civility. "But we are very firm that if you don't, then you're going to be out...then they are not welcome for the rest of the winter." "We are prepared for changes in the weather and any actions we need to take for this behavior," as the weather gets colder. "We've been working with the Police Department and city administration about the folks in the park. And we've also been working with Darlene (Haf-ner, Glens Falls Police Department Social Worker), to better understand what is actually happening. "We had a group meeting with the community about our unhoused situation. We may have to do that again. Tough situations are in our backyard, and as a community, we can best approach it together."

lost the brakes on the car, and this is the place that they're hanging out.

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Steps City has taken

In August, the Glens Falls Common Council changed the "dusk to dawn" rule for hours that parks are open in the City to include City Park, which was previous-

ly explicitly excluded from the code. The City and Crandall Library have locked or shut off power to outlets around the City Park bandstand, on streetlights and on the exterior of the Library. These were being used to charge phones "and even operate a coffee pod machine." Crandall Library reduced the reach of

its free WiFi into the park.

Security cameras were added, adjusted

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and increased, per a report from the City. The mayor said a "very rough" estimate is there are about 200 homeless or unhoused individuals around Glens Falls. That's not hard data, but anecdotal, he urges, based on individuals who used Open Door's Code Blue emergency shelter over the prior two winters.

He estimates twice as many — again, unscientifically — "in and out of homelessness, or on the rocks."
